Organizational Background

Many students and their families have a hard time accessing and navigating the maze of public and private services. There may be ample resources in a community, but rarely is there someone on the ground who is able to connect these resources with the schools and students that need them most. Through a school-based coordinator, we bring community resources into schools to empower success for all students by removing barriers for students furthest from educational justice, keeping kids in schools and on the path to graduation and leveraging evidence, relationships and local resources to drive results. At Communities In Schools, we believe that every student, regardless of race, gender, ability, zip code, or socioeconomic background has what they need to realize their full potential in school and beyond. We walk by their side, in their communities, to challenge the systems and barriers that stand between them and their success in life.

Communities in Schools of Washington State began operations in 1996 and has expanded across the state, serving thousands of children each year. The CISCW affiliate opened during the 2021-2022 school year to begin serving youth in the Yakima school district.

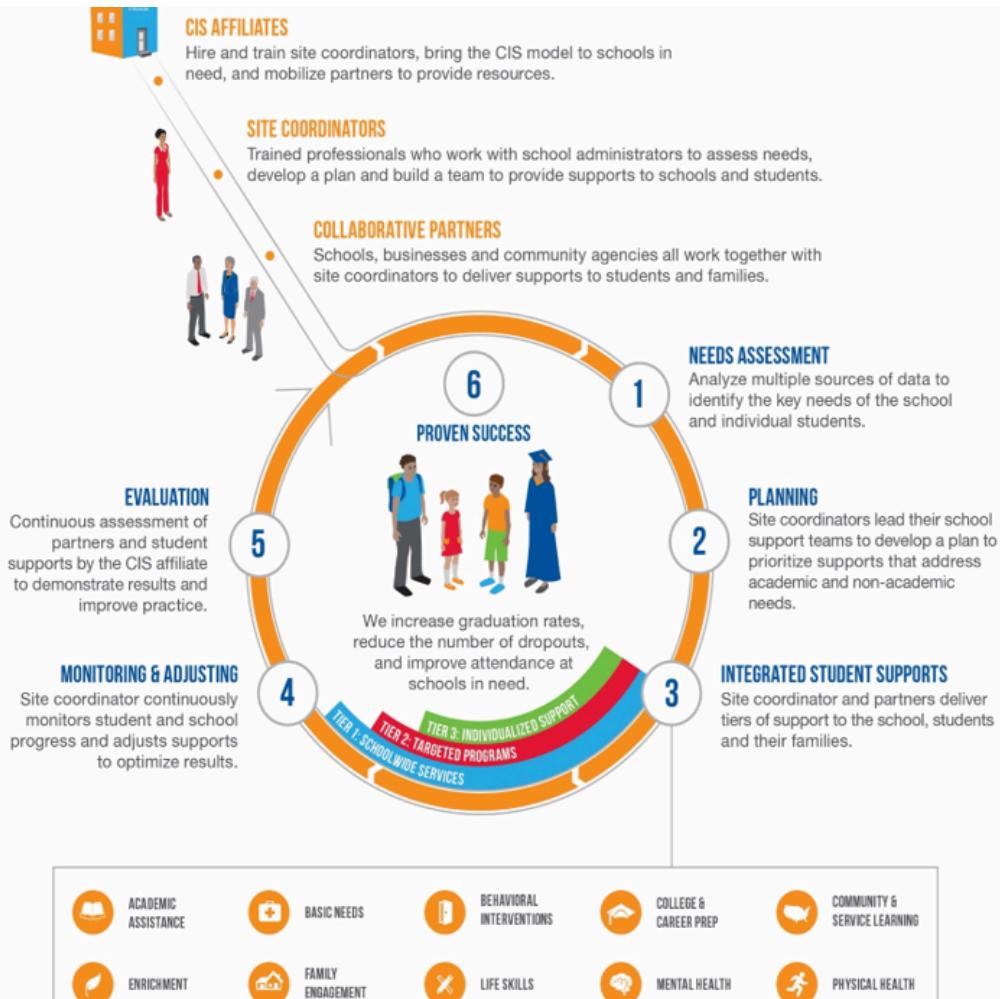
CIS Central WA Staff Diversity

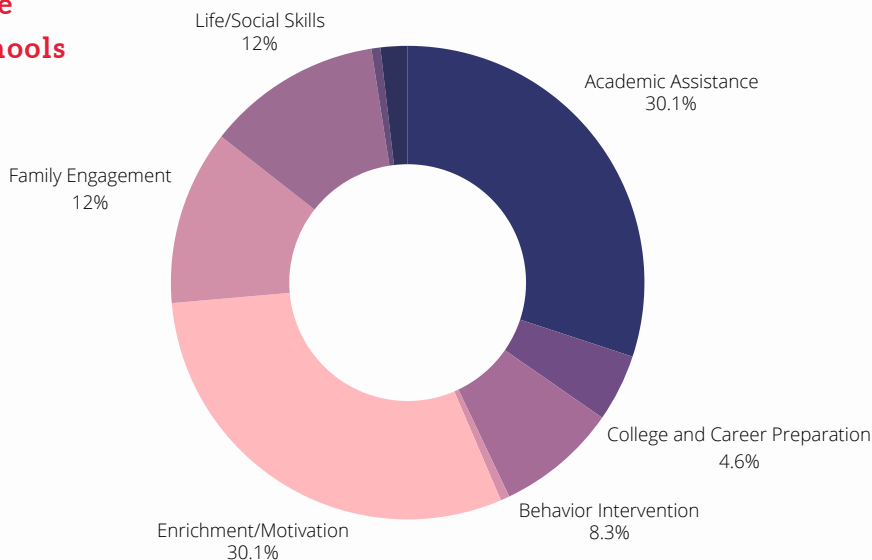
This school year, our Site Coordinators case managed 70 students and provided whole school supports to 1,405 students in 5 schools across the Yakima School District

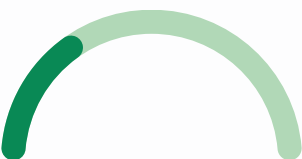
TIER II/III SUPPORTS

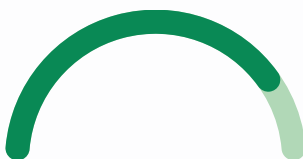

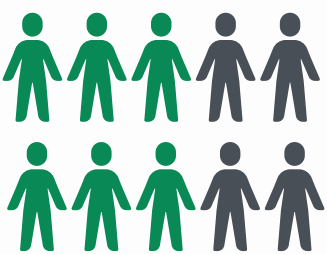

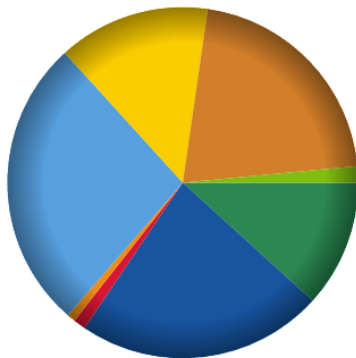

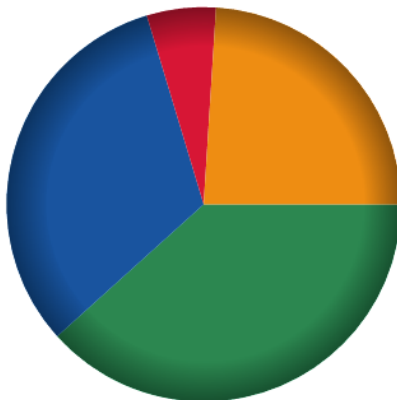

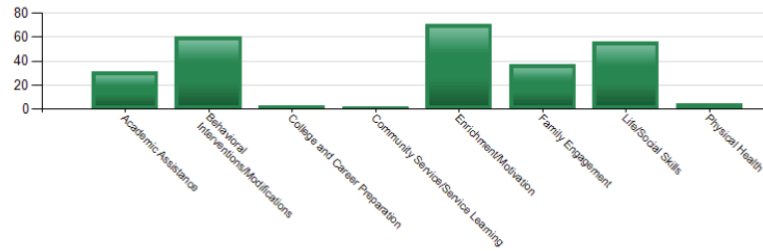

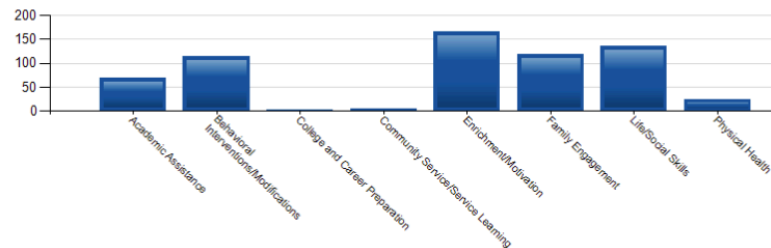

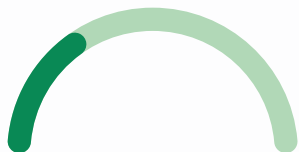

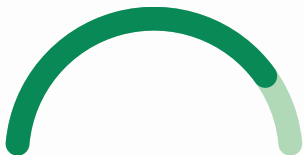

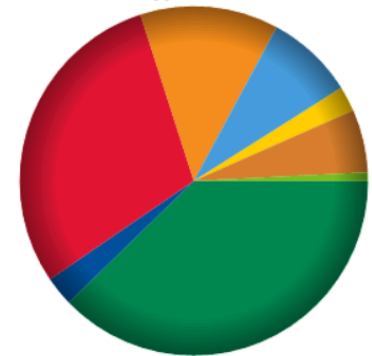

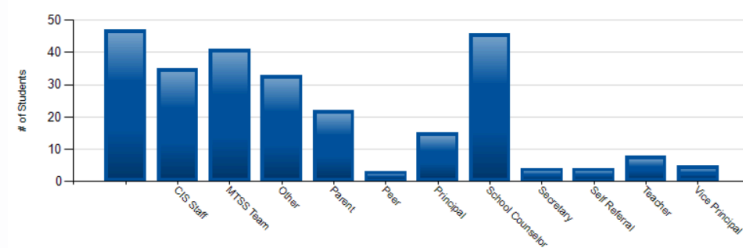
